Scripture

What will we do in worship? When the Church gathers around Word and sacrament, it does so in the freedom of the gospel. However, for centuries the Church across the world has used the Christian calendar and lectionary as the basis for its proclamation and as the foundation on which its services, seasons, and songs are built.

The Christian calendar sets the rhythm of Christian worship throughout the year. Advent's preparation leads to a Christmas celebration and Epiphany's proclamation. After a quiet Lent and a triumphant Easter, the Church in the year's second half after Pentecost moves to a season of growth in faith.

For every occasion on the calendar, the lectionary provides a set of readings, prayers, psalms, and other appointments. This set of days and readings enables us to share the counsel of God with the congregation in a pattern that emphasizes the life of Christ and the teachings of Christ. As an added blessing, that pattern ties our worship to the historic Church and current Christian communities, echoing the unity we will enjoy with all Christians in heaven.

The new hymnal provides a daily lectionary, a one-year lectionary, and a three-year lectionary for the Christian calendar. The historic one-year lectionary and updated three-year lectionary include appointed prayers, psalms, and Gospel acclamations. Thematic Sundays are a chief feature of the new three-year lectionary. All the resources share a common focus. The Gospel sets the theme for the Sunday and largely matches the Gospel selections in other three-year lectionaries. The First Reading replaces some prophetic readings with Old Testament narratives that match the theme of the Gospel. The Second Reading is a selection that supports the Sunday's Gospel. The Prayer of the Day, Psalm of the Day, Gospel Acclamation, and Hymn of the Day are appointed to match the Sunday theme. The Season after Pentecost has its Propers (readings) assigned by calendar date range, corresponding with other church bodies and enabling easier use of liturgical resources.

The Lectionary

Five years of intense study and collaborative efforts on the part of the Scripture Committee have resulted in a wonderfully updated resource—the *Christian Worship* lectionary. This series of readings for the church year will serve extremely well as the basis for all of a congregation's public worship planning.



Daily Lectionary

One of the chief reasons for publishing a hymnal (in both print and digital formats) is to provide a devotional resource that can be used for many years. The daily lectionary printed in *Christian Worship: Hymnal* is one such devotional resource. Each day includes both an Old Testament and a New Testament reading. The daily lectionary will take readers through nearly all of the New Testament and one-third of the Old Testament each year.

- 1 Continuous readings within a single Bible book allow readers to review the overall themes of an entire book.
- 2 Readings regularly match the times and seasons of the year: messianic prophecies from Isaiah are read during Advent; the first chapters of Matthew and Luke are read during the Christmas season.



The Service

The preview of the Rites section of the hymnal features one setting of The Service, a version of the historic liturgy of the Western Christian church. The progression familiar to worshipers in our church body is evident. Worshipers will also notice a few elements of The Service that are new:

- 1 The text of "Lord, Have Mercy" traces its origins to the Eastern church's Litany of Peace.
- 2 The responses after the readings ("The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.") are widely used throughout the Christian world, and they provide a simple, interactive way to acknowledge the gifts God gives in his Word.
- 3 One change in the progression of The Service is to pray the Prayer of the Church before the offering. (Also noticeable is that the congregation is invited to be seated for this longer prayer.)
- The Prayer of Thanksgiving is both ancient and new; a version of this prayer was reintroduced in *Christian Worship: Supplement*.

While some things are new, the time-tested rhythms of worship remain. We gather as those baptized into Christ. We confess our sins and receive God's forgiveness. Confident in Christ's mercy, we pray for one another and for people everywhere. We praise the holy name of our God. He speaks to us in his Word, and we speak to one another with psalms and hymns. Together with believers around the globe, we confess the faith. We offer our prayers and gifts. We acclaim Christ as we prepare to meet him in the Supper. We give thanks while remembering his saving acts. Our Savior, present in his body and blood, gives us forgiveness, life, and salvation. We go out to serve in the name of the Lord, shielded by his blessing of peace.

The Service is presented as the standard for Communion services in the new hymnal. Three musical settings of The Service will be printed in the hymnal, with several more available electronically. Each setting will offer different music but retain the same progression and basic texts. Working from this standard, worship planners and leaders will add variety and make adaptations fitting for their congregations and mission fields.



"The Service" is the title we are using for a rite of worship with Holy Communion. A single text is used in each of the three settings of The Service. That single text begins with two options for Confession.



Silence for meditation and reflection.



- 3 Two options for Confession are offered in each setting of The Service.
- Red lines indicate optional choices: a unique textual introduction to each Confession signals which option will be used without requiring the minister to make an unnecessary announcement to those worshiping from the book. When reproducing The Service with Christian Worship: Service Builder, only one Confession option will be printed.

Having a single text for The Service is intended to foster familiarity with both the words and the flow of the rite. In a short amount of time, all worshipers—young children, nonreaders, the visually impaired, etc.—can become familiar with the text that carries these timeless truths to the head and heart. The individual elements of The Service also follow the same pattern across the different settings. A general Kyrie (next page) will always follow the absolution; the Creed will always follow the sermon.




Kyrie and Gloria

While the single text of The Service fosters familiarity, the different musical settings will provide variety. That musical variety begins with the music of the Kyrie, which is unique to each setting of The Service. Three different musical settings of The Service will appear in the hymnal pew edition. Five or six more settings of The Service will be available in *Christian Worship: Service Builder*.

The Kyrie that appears in each setting of The Service is a general Kyrie. It does not appear in connection with the confession of sins. Appearing after the absolution, the Kyrie asks for God's mercy to be shown to us in several different and important ways as we live out our days in the peace of God's forgiveness.

Setting Two¹ (below) and Setting Three (hymnal pew edition) have musical settings both for organ and brass and for piano/guitar/ensemble. Both organ and piano settings of the liturgical songs are printed out in full in *Christian Worship: Accompaniment for Services*. Additional instrumental parts for all liturgical music will be available digitally in *Christian Worship: Musician's Resource*.

- 1 While printed with music, the minister's parts of the Kyrie may also be spoken.
- 2 For ease of singing, congregational parts of the Kyrie have a repeating melodic pattern.
- The music of the introduction is printed to clearly show when singing is to begin.
- When a composer has written music that is intended for unison singing, only the melody is printed.

Gospel Acclamation


New to The Word section of The Service is standing for the Gospel Acclamation (previously called the Verse of the Day). To acclaim the Gospel is to express enthusiastic approval of it. Our King is coming to us in the Gospel as we hear the words and works of Jesus. We stand to welcome him and his healing message of pardon and life.

A verse of the day situated between alleluia refrains is a pattern familiar to worshipers. That pattern is used in the hymnal pew edition with seasonal verses that may be chanted between the refrains either by the minister or by a cantor or by the entire assembly.

The Word The Lord be with you. And also with you. Prayer of the Day Let us pray. The Prayer of the Day is spoken, concluding with: ... one God, now and forever. Amen. Be seated First Reading After the reading: The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God. Psalm of the Day **Second Reading** After the reading: The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

To provide variety over years of use, *Christian Worship: Service Builder* will also include more than a dozen different alleluia refrains, along with a proper verse of the day for every individual festival across years A, B, and C.

- 1 "Thanks be to God," spoken as a response to the readings, will quickly become second nature for worshipers.
- 2 Standing before the Gospel Acclamation is a new pattern for our worship.
- 3 Seasonal verses may be sung as part of the Gospel Acclamation, but many more proper verses of the day are available.



The Creed

One of the reasons for utilizing a single text in The Service is to keep the individual elements of that single text in the same place across different settings.

- Standardizing the placement of the Creed after the sermon removes any wondering about where the Creed is spoken week after week.
- 2 Many congregations speak the Apostles' Creed in services that do not include Holy Communion.

Prayer of the Church

The Prayer of the Church does not have a historical connection with the beginning of the Holy Communion service. For this reason, the Prayer of the Church has been set apart from the beginning of the Holy Communion service by being placed before the gathering of the offering. Worshipers are also invited to be seated for this prayer, which is lengthy at times.

As with the Kyrie, the minister's parts of the Preface dialogue may be spoken. Congregations may also wish to enlist the services of a cantor for these sung minister's parts.

- 1 Worshipers are seated for the Prayer of the Church.
- 2 The gathering of the offering follows the Prayer of the Church and provides an appealing pause to mark the transition between the two chief parts of The Service.

Prayer of Thanksgiving

Worshipers were reacquainted with the use of a Prayer of Thanksgiving in *Christian Worship: Supplement*, Divine Service II. That prayer returns to its historical location within the service of Holy Communion.

It is truly good and right that we should at all times and in all places give you thanks, O Lord, holy Father, almighty and everlasting God, through Jesus Christ, our Lord . . .

- A Prayer of Thanksgiving as part of the Holy Communion rite is now standard across all settings of The Service.



- 2 A variety of materials are available in the hymn section and in *Christian Worship: Service Builder* for those wishing to sing the optional closing hymn or canticle.

Psalms

Martin Luther said, "No devotional book has ever appeared that is superior to the Psalms. They clearly and prophetically detail the death and resurrection of Christ. The Psalms, inspired by the Holy Spirit, are the songs of his people, his Church, with hearts laid open, praising and lamenting. They are our words of devotion" (*Luther's Interpretation of the Psalms*, translated by Paul Prange).

Congregations that enjoy the current hymnal's psalm style will be able to find something for every service. Congregations that prefer metrical paraphrases or more lyrical settings will be able to find something as well. Each of the psalms appointed in the lectionary has a setting in the new hymnal. Alternate settings are available in the electronic resources. This *Preview* gives you a sample of those settings.

Settings for all 150 psalms are available in *Christian Worship: Psalter*. This new resource provides accessible settings for individuals, choirs, and congregations to chant or sing all 150 psalms. *Psalter* settings for Psalm 33 are provided in this *Preview*.

The new *Psalter* has a basic pattern. Each psalm is printed in its entirety and is pointed to be chanted in the current style with familiar chant tones provided. A psalm prayer is followed by both an explanation of how the Church has used that psalm through the ages and then commentary on that particular psalm from a fresh translation of Martin Luther. The settings follow, representing treasures old and new.

Every psalm in the *Psalter* has a setting in a responsorial style, familiar to WELS congregations. In addition, all psalms have settings in metrical paraphrases, which look like hymns. Many of the tunes are new to WELS. Some of them are from the previous WELS hymnal but are not in the current hymnal. Almost all of them are printed in singable and playable four-part harmony. Many of the psalms have additional lyrical settings with melodies that will stay in the ear.

Responsorial Psalms


The responsorial style is a familiar one. The melody of the Psalm 23 refrain (MOORLOUGH SHORE; left page) is also known by the name THE SALLEY GARDENS. The full tune will be used for one of the hymns in the hymnal pew edition. An excerpt of that tune provides a fresh and pastoral musical setting for the refrain line of this well-loved psalm.

Slashes have been chosen to mark the cadence. When printed in black and white, the slash is still a distinctive mark. This mark assists worshipers with color blindness to distinguish the cadence.

About 80 percent of the psalms printed in the hymnal are in this familiar responsorial format. Several other psalm formats will appear in the hymnal pew edition, as demonstrated in the following pages of this *Preview*. A new book entitled *Christian Worship: Psalter* (featured on pp. 26-31) will have all 150 psalms set in a wide variety of formats.

- Red tabs create a visible marker on the edge of the hymnal, making it fast and easy for worshipers to locate the psalms section.
- 2 Four-part harmony is provided for all psalm tones.
- Red slashes indicate the cadence (musical shift) at the end of each line.
- 4 Alternate tones are occasionally offered.
- 5 A well-known liturgical song based on Psalm 8 provides a very familiar and sturdy refrain.




Melodic Folk Tunes

Tens of thousands of musical settings for the psalms exist. The Psalmody Committee reviewed literally thousands of them. Psalm settings come in a wide variety of musical styles. This version of Psalm 63 makes use of an Irish folk tune for three paraphrased verses and adds a refrain to emphasize one of the main themes of the psalm.


- 1 This setting offers a refrain with lyrical verses.
- These verses are set to an Irish folk tune.

The modern setting below has a catchy rhythm—a rhythm that may be more easily learned by performance than by counting. It's the kind of music that worshipers will want to practice and repeat a few times when first getting familiar with it. Introduction and assistance from cantors or a choir will be helpful. Note how the verses are sung in unison, while the refrain may be sung in parts. This modern psalm setting may be led by organ or played by piano/guitar/ensemble.





Call and Response

Minister, cantor, or choir can sing the verses of Psalm 136 above, with the assembly singing the response. Of course, call and response singing can be carried out in a number of different ways based on local preference and resources.

- This psalm, like many others offered, works naturally in call and response format.
- 2 All metrical psalms include a note indicating the associated hymn tune and meter for useful cross-referencing with associated tune resources.



Metrical Paraphrase


A metrical paraphrase renders the words of psalm verses into rhymed meter. Metrical psalms are sung like hymns. We already know a number of such psalms from our past hymnals: "Oh, Bless the Lord, My Soul" is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 103 and "O God, Our Help in Ages Past" is a metrical paraphrase of Psalm 90. On this page we have the cathedral tune JERUSALEM carrying the royal text of Psalm 145.

Christian Worship: Psalter

Christian Worship: Psalter is a self-standing volume that includes the full texts of all 150 psalms. Like the hymnal pew edition, this volume will have broad usage possibilities, from individual devotional use to placement in church pews next to the hymnal. Greatly expanding on the 62 psalm settings offered in the hymnal pew edition, *Christian Worship: Psalter* will have approximately 450 psalm settings, an average of three musical settings per psalm.

In addition to the entire set of rites and hymns in *Christian Worship: Hymnal*, the entire set of psalms available in *Christian Worship: Psalter* will be offered for use in *Christian Worship: Service Builder*.



 - The Church sings Psalm 33 to praise the Lord for his power and his love. This is one of the few psalms with no superscription. Martin Luther said, "Psalm 33 is a psalm of thanksgiving. The psalmist thanks God in general for his blessings, especially for helping believers in every need, not letting them perish. Because God made all things with a word, nothing is impossible for him. Because he is good and true, he wants to help and does so gladly, as he has promised in the First Commandment: 'I will be your God, that is, I will be your comfort, help, holiness, life, and everything good, and I will stand against everything that could harm you.'"

Responsorial and Metrical Paraphrases


Every psalm will have at least two musical settings in the *Psalter*. One of the two will be a responsorial setting (Psalm 33A), and the other, a metrical paraphrase (Psalm 33B). This minimum level of stylistic variety ensures that congregations will have psalmody options that match their musical resources and local customs.


- Worshipers will delight to hear familiar psalm refrains retained from the current hymnal.
- This metrical paraphrase is set to a familiar tune (ELLACOMBE).

Lyrical Verses with Refrain

PSALM 33

Psalm settings commonly appear with a refrain and lyrical verses. This format allows for a great deal of variety based on each congregation's available resources. A cantor or small group may sing the verses, with the assembly singing the refrain. The choir can add harmony to the refrain. Over time, in some congregations, the entire assembly may learn to sing the verses as well.

- Several psalms include refrains that can be sung in four-part harmony.
- 2 Lyrical verses benefit from cantor or choir leadership but may also be learned over time by an entire congregation.

Hymns

Human beings are emotional creatures. We grieve over sin. We are comforted by Christ's forgiveness. We mourn our losses. We rejoice in the promise of the resurrection. Music has a unique ability to touch human emotion with a finger of sound. Not surprisingly, many view music's primary purpose as touching human emotions.

But the Church's song needs to be more than a mover of emotion. Why? Because the human creature is more than the ebb and flow of our emotions.

God also created us with the gift of reason. Christians are blessed as they place this gift into the service of the gospel. The Scriptures must be carefully read. Scriptural doctrine must be accurately taught. The message must be personally understood.

During the Reformation, Martin Luther set his sharp mind to the task of translating the Scriptures into the language of the common people. Luther also set his musician's heart to the task of providing a new song for the people to sing. In 1524, the first Lutheran hymnal, the so-called *Achtliederbuch (Book of Eight Songs)*, rolled off the printing presses. The eight hymns in this slender volume served a grand purpose:

Several Christian Songs, Hymns of Praise and Psalms, in Accordance with the Pure Word of God, from Holy Scripture, Produced by Various Highly Learned Individuals, for Singing in the Church, as in Part Is Already the Practice in Wittenberg.

Articulated in that title and rhymed in the individual stanzas, one discovers this noble purpose for Lutheran hymnody: teaching the saving doctrine of Christ. Through these eight hymns, hearts were touched because Christ himself was proclaimed. Christ was at the center of the *Achtliederbuch*.


The hymns in this *Preview* already outnumber those in the *Achtliederbuch*. The styles of music have also changed. But much more remains the same: These hymns will touch God's people emotionally, teach the Scriptures accurately, and proclaim the riches of the Savior musically. May it please the Lord of the Church for us to use these hymns—and hundreds more like them that will follow—as preachers and teachers of Christ to a generation yet unborn!

A Singer's Book

The hymns of *Christian Worship: Hymnal* are formatted on the page to benefit singers. Here, the traditional Advent hymn "On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry" has a straightforward four-part harmonization. Some worshipers may wish to sing this chorale-type hymn in parts. Including up to five stanzas inside the music staves is intended to benefit the singer.


Christian Worship: Accompaniment for Hymns (not shown) is a separate and different volume. Its pages are formatted for the benefit of the keyboardist. Stanzas between the musical staves are limited to a maximum of three so that the staves stay closer together. The music in the accompaniment edition is also scaled larger than the music in the pew edition so that the accompanist can more easily read the music when it is on a music stand 2 to 3 feet away.


- Over four hundred hymns from *Christian Worship* (1993) and *Christian Worship: Supplement* will be included in the pew edition of the new hymnal.
- 2 Hymns with up to five stanzas will have the text inside the music staves for the benefit of worshipers who want to follow the melody more closely or who wish to sing in parts.



Timeless Hymns

"A Child Is Born in Bethlehem" is an example of how great Christian hymns are truly timeless. The hymn (both Christmas and Epiphany versions) has a 13th-century Latin text, a 13th-century tune, an early 17th-century harmonization by Lutheran composer Michael Praetorius, and a 21st-century English translation. The singing of the assembly is supported equally well by organ or a lively piano and guitar ensemble.





This early 19th-century text, which appeared in *The Lutheran Hymnal* and in *Christian Worship* (1993), appears in our new hymnal with a fresh new tune by a Lutheran composer. The music comes from a choral arrangement, so this hymn will benefit from readily available organ, brass, and choral parts to add to the congregation's song.


Especially useful for personal devotions, Bible passage references will appear at the bottom right corner of every hymn.

- 1 The hymn corpus will include classic and ancient hymns that are new to us.
- A new approach to numbering starts the hymns at 151 to avoid the confusing overlap of page and psalm numbers.
- 3 Clear and attractive typographical hierarchy improves the clarity, legibility, and scannability of hymn headers.
- 4 Bible verses relevant to the hymn are offered for reference and devotional purposes.

Melody Lines and Common Tunes

Melody-only hymns do more than save space in the printed book. Some hymns are not written for singing in parts. Others are intended by the composer to be sung in unison.


For example, "Triune God, O Be Our Stay" is based on a 14th-century German litany and was originally sung as a 16th-century chorale (fourpart hymn). Today the hymn is often overlooked. Nevertheless, this is a classic Lutheran hymn arranged by Luther's close colleague Johann Walter and published in 1524, just after the first Lutheran hymnal. An accessible presentation designed to assist singers continues to give this work an important place as a festival hymn to the Holy Trinity—well worth learning, retaining, and singing.




A hymnal project includes an incalculable amount of research. Hymn research involves examining text and tune pairings, that is, how commonly a certain text is sung to a particular tune. A hymnal project gives consideration to how a hymn is sung across the wider swath of Christianity. Not always, but in some cases we align our text and tune pairings with those of the broader Christian church. This hymn is one such case.

Charles Wesley wrote over 6,500 hymns. His hymn "Oh, for a Thousand Tongues to Sing" has been published in over 1,500 hymnals. In relatively recent years, at least 150 hymnals paired the Wesley text with the tune AZMON, as shown below, rather than the tune used in *Christian Worship* 1993, entitled BEATITUDO. The BEATITUDO tune appears with Wesley's text in only two hymnals.

- Various types of hymns will appear with the melody only—especially when beneficial for the singer.
- 2 AZMON is the most common tune to carry this hymn text.





Modern Music with Strong Texts

Stuart Townend has often teamed up with Keith Getty to present to the Church modern hymns that are very focused on the grace of God and the rescue from our sins that Jesus has gained for us. *Christian Worship: Hymnal* will have a strong showing of the best modern hymns available.


Most modern hymn writers compose for the piano. Simply put, many piano arrangements won't fit on two pages or include so many notes that the text is almost lost within the music. In such cases, while the hymnal pew edition may present only the melody or a four-part (SATB) version of a hymn (as shown here), *Christian Worship: Accompaniment for Hymns* will always include the full piano score for hymns that have been written for piano.


Musicians will have access to a structured database of additional musical materials available for purchase in a variety of formats that will fit well into their existing paper-based and digital workflows.

Charitie Lees de Chenez, a pastor's daughter, was born in the county of Dublin, Ireland, June 21, 1841. By her early 20s she had already written a number of hymns, and by the time she was 26 her hymns had been gathered and published. During its research years, the Hymnody Committee ranked "Before the Throne of God Above" as one of the strongest texts it had come across. Modern musician Vikki Cook provided a beautiful new tune in 1997. As with many of the modern hymns, arrangements for piano and other instruments will be readily available for this outstanding hymn.

- A modern hymn by Stuart Townend gives beautiful expression to the truth of the gospel.
- A four-part arrangement allows for various types of keyboard accompaniment.
- This is an example of a superb text wrapped in modern music.

American Hymn Writers

Modern hymn writers are not shying away from ancient texts. In this case, Christian worship leaders Matt Boswell and Matt Papa made use of a line from an old John Newton ("Amazing Grace") sermon—"our sins are many, but his mercies are more"—to craft an excellent new worship song with many scriptural allusions. The piano score will appear in *Christian Worship: Accompaniment for Hymns*. Arrangements for other instruments will be available in *Christian Worship: Musician's Resource*.

- Traditional American hymnody brings clear gospel truths through hymns that may be new to us.
- 2 During years of extensive research, hundreds of modern hymns were reviewed. Some of the best will appear in *Christian Worship: Hymnal*.


Psalm Paraphrases

Music from around the world reminds us that we stand together with all fellow believers in the Holy Christian Church. The Indonesian hymn below is based on Psalm 148.

- This is an Indonesian tune (NYANYIKANLAH) and musical arrangement.
- We include some modern songs that have become popular across English-speaking Christianity.
- 3 In a handful of instances, some of the verses in verse/refrain songs are challenging to sing. Some congregations may have a soloist or a small choir sing these verses, while other congregations will learn and ultimately sing the entire song in unison.





Alternate Tunes



Christian Worship: Service Builder not only includes the entire hymnal but also allows worship planners to import and use congregational favorites from other sources.



New Translations and Authors


Some modern hymns are tremendous in the way they capture the message of the Christian gospel with new phrases and fresh music. Some hymns that are tremendous are actually older hymns with an updated translation, reminding us of the faith we have in common with Christians from ages past. In *The Lutheran Hymnal*, the tune HERR, WIE DU WILLST was tightly connected to a text entitled "Lord, as Thou Wilt, Deal Thou with Me." That text has been updated under the title "Order My Life, Lord, as You Will" and is still paired with a tune that traces back to Strassburg in 1525.

Lutheran author Jaroslav Vajda wrote a fine text on the topic of Christian training of the young. Lutheran musician and composer Jeremy Bakken has provided a new tune and musical arrangement to bring this new Home and Education hymn to our churches.

Modern Favorites

The four hymns by Stuart Townend and Keith Getty published in *Christian Worship: Supplement* were well-received. *Christian Worship* (2021) will include more strong, scriptural songs written by these gifted hymn writers.

- 1 Some hymns in the hymnal pew edition will include a piano arrangement.
- 2 This hymn is an adaptation of a choir anthem. Having a choir sing the anthem several times is a good way to introduce the hymn to the congregation.
- Melody-only arrangements occasionally appear in the hymnal when the original score is too lengthy. Less than 15 percent of the hymns in the new hymnal will appear as melody-only.

Time-Honored Texts, Fresh Music

Hymn writers continue to find that older, tried-and-true texts retain their value over centuries of time. Presenting these older texts with new music is a trend that has been steadily gaining traction over the last two to three decades. In "He Will Hold Me Fast," Matt Merker has presented new music for 19th-century author Ada Habershon's fine text on trusting in Christ's promise to never let go of us.



Beloved Texts and Tunes





From its earliest days, the Christian Church has used symbols, icons, and imagery to communicate and reinforce the doctrine and practice drawn from the Holy Scriptures. From stained glass to sculpture to tapestries to illuminated manuscripts, the tradition of art in service of faith is deep. Lutheranism, in particular, from its beginning has made effective use of visual communication. Carrying on the tradition, the *Christian Worship* suite of worship resources will feature a new set of iconography for our time. We have worked with a distinguished liturgical artist, Mr. Nicholas Markell, to create a set of icons that provides not only ornamentation but also edification. The new hymnal's art direction is tailored to the hymnal's setting, theology, and function.

The icons are not abstract. Each one directly communicates a clear, overarching concept like "baptism" or "prayer." The icons are drawn to reinforce historical Christian associations between word and image and, whenever possible, Lutheran theological distinctives. The icons communicate clearly. At the same time, each icon also includes a rich amount of symbolic and didactic detail. The subtle element of mystery and symbolism has been designed to reward repeated consideration by worshipers over the many years the hymnal will be in use. We anticipate that over time thoughtful worshipers will notice details they once overlooked along with subtle but intentional connections between the various icons in the book. Both children and adults will discover again the joy of God's Word embedded in art.

The style of the icons employs a unique tactic—the shapes of the various elements in the icons are drawn directly from the shapes of the letterforms in the hymnal's typeface. Such an approach allows for a wide variety of shapes and proportions among the individual icons while also preserving a visual unity to the set. Indeed, by literally connecting the words to the images, we can say that every shape on the page appears in genuine harmony—from the smallest lowercase letters to the major components of the icons.

Christian Worship will therefore enjoy an aesthetic advantage not typically enjoyed by Lutheran hymnals—and your congregation will be able to enjoy the same in your printed worship folders. The full set of 30 major icons along with dozens of variations of those icons will be available for purchase and use in congregational settings.
