Foreword

Perhaps the two most frequent questions asked about a new hymnal are “What new hymns will I find?” and “What did you cut?” The second question can easily generate disappointment as someone finds that a dearly loved hymn is not slated for inclusion. But it’s impossible to answer the first question without cutting some hymns. Can cuts be made in an objective and fair manner? Yes, to a large degree. Criteria include frequency of use and achieving a balance in seasonal/topical sections. For example, it wouldn’t work to include several new Easter and Christmas hymns without also cutting some. Without some cuts, there wouldn’t be sufficient room in other seasons/topics.

But more exciting than talking about cut hymns is the topic of new hymns. Not every new hymn will be a home run, but some will be. When WELS adopted a new hymnal in 1941, two home runs not in our earlier hymnals were “For All the Saints” and “O Come, O Come, Emmanuel.” In 1993 high usage candidates include “Amazing Grace”; “This Joyful Eastertide”; “Go, My Children, with My Blessing”; and “The King of Love My Shepherd Is” (retuned from 1941). A high usage hymn from the 2008 hymnal supplement is “In Christ Alone.”

The Hymn Preview that follows is a partial glimpse of the new hymns. But it’s only a sample. The new hymnal will contain over 200 new hymns (some old but new to us). Many gems beyond those featured in this preview await discovery. Copyright restrictions prevent sharing a preview of everything. Some publishers do not allow sharing their material in this way. But it is an informative sample.

In addition, a comprehensive list of 683 hymns and liturgical songs from both the pew edition and *CW: Service Builder* is available at christianworship.com. This list is available in three formats: Excel, RTF, and PDF. The first two formats allow users to sort on the various columns to review the new hymnal from different angles. Some musicians have already asked what new tunes will be in the new hymnal so that they can be purchasing music in advance to support those tunes. The “Tune” column will help them to identify new tunes. (The list is tentative, pending copyright permissions.)

The new hymnal website provides two additional lists: hymns cut from CW93 and CWS (not including those that are retuned) and hymns from CW93 and CWS that have been retuned.

The table of contents on page 4 includes information on each hymn’s musical genre or stylistic origin. Note that this preview includes an almost even split between more modern hymns (defined in four categories) and hymns from earlier traditions.

For select hymns, both piano and organ accompaniments are included. These do not imply that other hymns in this preview with only one accompaniment option will lack the other option. Generally, pianistic hymns will also have a “block chord” option or an organ accompaniment, but not always. Some pianistic hymns simply don’t translate well to SATB harmony or organ accompaniment.

In some cases, comments on a hymn include a link to a YouTube option to hear the hymn. These active hyperlinks appear in blue underlined font.

Many of the modern hymns are available on YouTube, almost always in a “full band” version that may not be an optimal rendition for a typical WELS church. But note what separates most of these songs from the genre commonly called Christian contemporary music (CCM). In addition to offering a solid and substantive text, most modern hymns in the new hymnal lack the soloistic and rhythmic complexity of many CCM songs. Most work as well with a simple piano accompaniment. For several of the modern hymns, *CW: Accompaniment for Hymns* will include newly crafted organ settings for those churches that prefer organ or that lack a piano capable of solidly leading congregational singing.
