

MLC SUMMER REPORT

COMMENCEMENT - MAY 16, 2020



On Saturday, May 16, at 10:00 am, **148 students earned degrees** marking the completion of their ministerial training at Martin Luther College. Degrees awarded were 39 preseminary Bachelor of Arts degrees and one seminary certification, 99 Bachelor of Science in Education degrees (including 15 early childhood education degrees), eight Bachelor of Science degrees (including one staff ministry degree and seven educational studies degrees), and one staff ministry certification.

In addition, 15 students received their **Master of Science** in Education degrees, and eight students earned their Master of Science in Educational Administration degrees.

The **virtual Commencement Service** recorded in the Chapel of the Christ was conducted by presiding minister Rev. James Pope. MLC President Mark Zarling presented the commencement sermon on the theme, "Where's My Jesus?" Dr. Jeff Wiechman, vice president for academics, read the names of the students receiving degrees.

On May 16, during the WELS Reading of Assignments, **150 assignments were issued.** In category 1 (candidates who are available for assignment anywhere), 120 were assigned: 64 current graduates and 55 previous graduates. In category 4 (candidates who are limited to a certain geographic area), 30 were assigned: 13 current graduates and 17 previous graduates.



ADMISSIONS UPDATE

Our Admissions team's communication with prospective students has been very productive this spring. Because the team cannot travel, they are devoting more time to virtual visits and electronic communication.

Admissions Counselor Lori Unke commented, "It seems as if the high school students are more comfortable sharing their thoughts from the privacy of their homes than in a noisy office somewhere in their school. This has led to some quality ministry conversations!"

The team has also had time to be more active on social media—responding to high school posts, acknowledging students' achievements, and reaching out to future Knights and their families. With all this additional guidance and communication provided by the MLC admissions counselors, the status of the enrollment process is actually improved.

Director of Admissions Mark Stein provided this update: "Applications are ahead of last year, along with admits and deposits. If the trend continues, we should see a larger freshman class interested in considering their future here at MLC. The MLC class of 2024 is an exciting group of young people from all over the country and world willing to consider serving!"

REV. MARK ZARLING RETIRES



Rev. Mark Zarling, president of Martin Luther College from 2007 to 2020, is retiring this summer. During President Zarling's tenure, God has blessed the college in countless ways.

The campus saw the construction of beautiful new facilities funded by God's people: Chapel of the Christ, the Early Childhood Learning Center, a baseball field, and a soccer pitch.

The academic catalog expanded to include many new majors, as well as minors in urban ministry and Chinese. The graduate program added two new degrees: Master of Science in Educational Administration and Master of Arts in Theological Studies. And continuing education offerings expanded tremendously, including the addition of New Teacher Induction.

President Zarling put the spotlight on lowering student debt, broadening international services, expanding experiential learning, and recruiting new students not merely to fill current vacancies but to prepare for new ministries still in development. Through all these changes, he kept the campus focused on the mission statement: "To train a corps of Christian witnesses . . . "

Faculty, staff, and synod leaders have called President Zarling a man of faith, a pastor-administrator, a humble visionary, a Christ-like leader, and MLC's spiritual compass. He spoke God's promises in the hallways, prayed with colleagues in their offices, and spiritually uplifted the whole college family.

"President Zarling has left an impression on Martin Luther College," said WELS President Mark Schroeder. "He has personally guided and shaped hundreds if not thousands of students. And through his leadership he has instilled in our synod's members a love for and a confidence in Martin Luther College."
